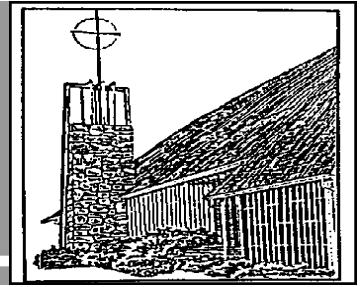

A MESSAGE FROM PASTOR MARY ROBINSON-MOHR

Last Saturday, I ran out the door to my car to go to a Presbytery meeting. On the way out, I noticed little dark green spikes in my flower bed. “Aha! The crocuses are coming up!” I said to myself. When I came home later that day, there were bright yellow blossoms just starting to unfold.

“Wow!” I thought, “That was fast!” I looked around my yard to see other little buds and sprouts looking far more noticeable than they have for months. Spring is definitely on its way to Bellingham.

That means Easter is on its way, too. It is a wonderful time of year to celebrate renewal and rebirth and the restoration of hope. Just as creation bursts out of its “tomb” of winter, we rejoice that Jesus bursts through death and brings life eternal and hope without end to us.

One of the Psalms appointed for both Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday is Psalm 118. Different verses are to be read on the two different Sundays, and it is rich with celebration and hope. It begins with the cry, “O give thanks to the LORD, for he is good; his steadfast love endures forever!” It also ends with this acclamation. Then, at the high point in the middle of the psalm, the writer proclaims, “The LORD is my strength and my might; he has become my salvation.” The psalm begins and ends with the goodness of God and the unending love of God, and the saving strength of God is in the middle.

It is almost like an outline of God’s work with us, though I’m not sure the writer intended that. God first loves us, and then as we walk through life, well, different things happen. Some are good, some are not. All of those chapters of life contain some measure of our failure and confusion, our hurt of self and our hurt of others. Our more unlovable traits come out, and many people in our world live and act as if this is the last word that God would have with us. “You should be good, but you aren’t. You are rejected,” seems to be

the assumption about God's view of us, whether on a conscious or unconscious level.

That's where God's action steps in to intervene. "The LORD is my strength and my might; he has become my salvation," says the psalm. When we fall short, God does not turn away from us. Just the opposite! God stretches out God's heavenly creating hand, and intervenes. God just can't turn away, because the love God has for us is indeed "forever." God's greatest outreach to us is in the death and resurrection of Jesus, our Easter joy.

It is because of this that the last chapter of the story of God's interaction with us can be, "For his steadfast love endures forever." The love of God surrounds our entire being.

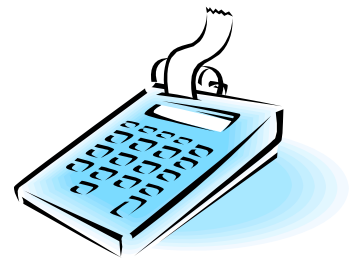

**TREASURER'S REPORT** SALLY ALBERS

We started 2008 with a bang! Several members have prepaid their pledges for the entire year, so that our income was nearly \$10,600 higher than January 2007 – a total of \$31,692.55. So, despite paying our annual per capita of \$11, 049.25 in January, the general fund balance actually increased from \$5,001 to \$7,355 in the month.

The stock market decline affected the value of our holdings in New Covenant Funds Balanced Growth fund – so that declined by about \$33,000 in January. Fortunately we do not need to sell any stocks in the short term. Perhaps by summer we will be seeing gains in endowment values once again.



As always, you can check the office windows to see financial statements for January for yourself. Renee knows where to put her hands on spare copies for you to take away if you prefer.

Meanwhile Jack Drury's Buildings & Grounds committee is moving forward on the capital improvements necessary to protect our building. The skylights over the staircase were replaced by Rainshield; the overgrown trees and shrubs trimmed in January by Beaver Tree Service. Some interior rooms will soon be receiving new furniture and carpeting. These are funded by the Endowment, from stock that was sold at a market peak last summer and invested in a less volatile money market fund, also at New Covenant Funds. We should all be grateful to those members who established and augmented our endowments in the past; their foresight and generosity has made it possible for us to continue to operate through difficult times.

During March a special fund-raising effort kicks off to support our expanded programs for 2008. We project a need of an additional \$13,000 above pledges in hand. I would like to see everyone participate in this drive – even small children. From pennies to thousands we “vote growth” with our dollars. St. James is at a turning point, where 2008 can be the year we began growing again. It takes foresight and generosity in a new generation of donors to live up to the legacy of our past.

Wow, I can't believe it's already March! Which of course means spring is almost here and hopefully we will have more sunny days. March also means St. Patrick Day is coming upon us, which always plays with my love of everything Celtic. One of my favorite Celtic designs is their use of the *triquetra* (three triangles connected) which Christians have taken to be a symbol for the Trinity. Each triangle represents a different part of God: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. We hear about the Trinity in the Bible:

“Then Jesus came to them and said, ‘All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.’” Matthew 28:18-20

There is a legend that St. Patrick used a shamrock to explain the Trinity when he was preaching. Each leaf represented a part of God, and while there were three separate leaves, they came together to create one plant. I think it's amazing that St. Patrick was able to use something that small and seemingly unimportant, and make a connection to explain such a huge and very important concept. It reminds me to constantly be aware of my surroundings, and how something very insignificant could, in fact, be used in a powerful way. Like my 5'2" friend always said, “Big things come in little packages!”

## "Are You Spiritual or Religious?"

As you contemplate that, think of it as an either/or type question? In her book Welcome to the Wisdom of the World, Joan Chittister writes, "Religion and spirituality are not the same thing: religion has to do with leading us to an awareness of God, with giving us the tools, the disciplines to make ourselves ready for the experience of God. Spirituality has to do with transforming the way we live as a result of the awareness, with infusing all of life with a sense of Presence that transcends the immediate and gives it meaning.

So, which do you learn when you read your Bible? Which comes from sitting in church? Which descends upon you when you gather in fellowship or sing hymns during worship or join in a discussion during a Sunday School class or a Bible Study? Hopefully a little bit of both. And, hopefully, prayerfully, those religious tools that help you grow as a spiritual person, that help draw you closer to God, become more familiar to you and easier to use each time you come to this place, each time you join in a class or come to a service.

Think you're too busy to be here on Sunday morning or for something else that's happening during the week? Think again. Your spiritual well being is just as important to maintain as the rest of your health. While you're planning your healthy meals and your walks around the neighborhood, start planning how to tend to your soul, as well. Then you'll be that much closer to being the person that Chittister describes when she says, "the spiritual person is the one who breathes in and out the spirit of the God toward which they move."

## A Big Thank You!

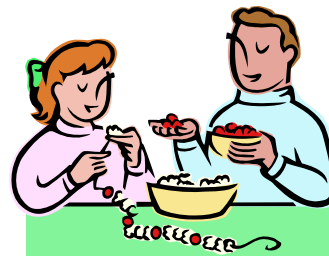
Have you looked in our Art Supply room, lately? Not the Resource Room, which is generally locked, but the art room, where we keep our construction paper and the long work table for art projects.

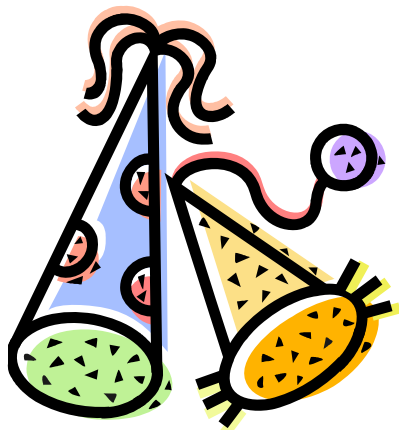

**SESSION HIGHLIGHTS ~ FEBRUARY 9, 2008** CARLA SHAFER, CLERK

The meeting opened with prayer. Presbytery commissioners for Saturday, February 23, 2008 in Mount Vernon will be Jan Resick and Bill Read.

Margaret DeMaine gave the Deacon's report. Valentine Gift bags will be given to shut-ins. March 2, 2008 is the Parish breakfast. The Session circulated a sign-up to help serve at the breakfast.

Sally Albers gave the Treasurer's report. Investments declined, but receivables were greater than expenses. St. James has a positive fund balance.

John Dobbie reported that Stewardship and Budget are developing a 2-3 year capital improvements budget. Mission giving will be timed for the second month of the quarter or when the money is there, with plans to pay the fourth quarter in December of each year.

Gary Culbertson reported for the Worship Committee that Bill Read is handling communion serving which will be done by units of the church. Choir members served in February. Session volunteers will serve in March.

The facility use fee was clarified. Groups who pay will pay for up to two meetings in a calendar month. More than two meetings in a month will have no additional charge. This becomes effective March 1, 2008

The following groups were approved for building use: Health Mapping meeting, Goldwing Road Riders Association, and the Augustine Fellowship SLAA (Sex-Love Addicts Anonymous). Saturdays will not be scheduled with regular groups which might conflict with church activities or weddings.

Jack Drury reported that the trees behind the church have been trimmed, one replaced and soil amended as needed. The skylight project is completed. Purchasing new furniture and tables includes arranging for ReStore taking the old tables and crediting Habitat for Humanity. The Lounge furniture will go to a needy family. Beaver Tree trimming project was completed last Saturday and he reduced his fee 50%. The Youth director's desk was replaced, and Bill made a shelf for her computer. An electrical wiring survey will be done and we'll get estimate of repair to the church electrical system. Repairs will start with the offices for staff and the Friendly Visitors program.

Christian Education Committee reported new materials and activities.

Wendy Crandall reported that Congregational Life Committee is supporting the valentines to shut-ins project. Rick Seater and Patty Cromarty are taking care of the Tall Timber Retreat. The Seder service will follow last year's format. The Women's Retreat will be at the church on April 26<sup>th</sup> and Bobbi Hargleroad (former editor of PCUSA Church and Society Magazine) will be the speaker.

Session approved serving a light breakfast at church from 9-10 on Sunday mornings. Wendy will start the breakfasts and she is looking for volunteers. Everyone who wants breakfast is welcome.

Randy Bower reported that the Membership committee's new meeting time is Monday night the week before Session at 7 PM.

Matt Hargleroad gave the report for Mission and Social Action. Gretchen and Pastor Tam are getting displays ready for Presbytery Mission Fair. We will have a speaker from Africa here at St. James on April 16, 2008.

Jean Seater reported for the Personnel Committee. Pastor Tam's permanent contract is ready to sign. It includes one Sunday per quarter off, as she is often requested to serve as pulpit supply.

Session approved a Maternity Leave Policy to give 3 paid weeks and 12 weeks unpaid. Our previous policy was ambiguous. This policy is in keeping with the minimal standards set by the Federal Family Leave Act. Staff sick

leave was changed from one week per year to two weeks per year. It does not accrue.

The Growth Planning Task Force update was presented by Randy. They will meet with two resource people from Presbytery. The Task Force is clear in its direction and will meet two times per month. Early recommendations are to increase communication and have Session members introduce the committees from the lectern during announcements on the first Sunday of the month (3 minutes or less). Session committee speakers will be picked monthly beginning with Building and Grounds.

The meeting closed with prayer.

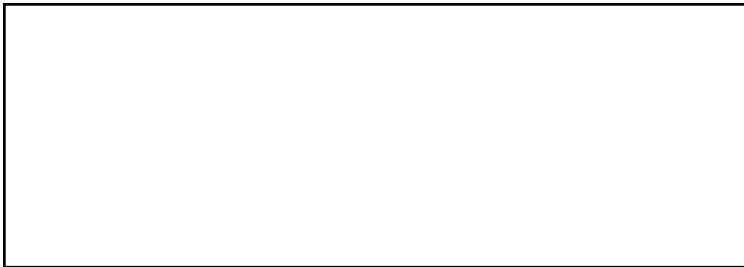
